

fty Years of Our Church's History



The task of giving a sketch of the history of this Congregation of easy because of the amount of material that should be included.

Like many other movements this Congregation had its day of ll things. When Verdun was a village the Verdun Methodist trch began its work in the home of John N. Way, Church Avenue, January 8th, 1899. Eighteen persons were present. The meeting opened by singing Hymn "To the work, to the work, We are rants of God". A Sunday School was thus begun of which Mr. ry Swetland was the first Superintendent; Mr. N. Peddle, Bible ss Teacher, and Mr. John N. Way, Secretary Treasurer; with a nary class in the parlour or front room; Adult Bible Class in the ing Room; older girls on the stairs in the hall, and the boys in the hen (where they liked to be). There being no organ Mr. Clement g led the singing with his silver cornet. (All these gentlemen have e passed on.)

It was only a matter of months until Sunday evening services were alarly held and supplied by local preachers from Centenary thodist Church.



It was in the year 1901 that Rev. A. C. Hoffman, then a student of Wesleyan College and now retired missionary from China gave assistance to the Church in this house, and also in the old Club house to which the Sunday School moved owing to lack of space in the home mentioned, where the attendance had reached sixty. The need of a Church building became apparent and therefore a Trustee Board was organized on August 26th 1902 to proceed with the undertaking.

A site was therefore secured on Gordon Avenue, on September 16th 1902 and on September 20th it was decided to erect a Church at an estimated cost of \$625.00. The labour was voluntary by men of the congregation. It was dedicated on the second Sunday of February 1903.



Rev. THOMAS BOLE 1906-1910




Rev. F. B. ALLNUTT 1910-1914


Given a Church, the congregation felt the need of a student minister. Dr. A. J. Martin, now of Westmount, was secured and ministered to the people for a short time. He was succeeded by Rev. Thos. Bole (now deceased). Mr. Bole was the first supply appointed by Conference, and at the Annual Conference of 1906, Verdun was placed on the list of stations. In the conference minutes of 1907 its first published report shows a membership of ninety-two.

On July 6th, 1906 the first Quarterly Official Board was organized as follows, William Rogers, Recording Steward; John N. Way, Representative of Trustee Board; Messrs. S. Hartley, J. Waldron and William Rogers, Stewards; Messrs. William Waugh, J. R. Bradbury and Clement King, Society Representatives; N. Peddle, Local Preacher and George Woodburn, Class Leader.

Under the guidance of a settled Minister the Church prospered was compelled to take the necessary steps to secure a larger ding. This discussion began in 1907. The contract was awarded in y 1908 and the Church was dedicated on the 13th of December of same year. The cornerstone of this Church was laid by the late 19th Allen, then Mayor of Verdun.

The ministers of the parent Church, Centenary Methodist, Point Charles, up to this point exercised a guiding hand over the official ons of this congregation, viz. Rev. David Winter, Rev. John vety and Rev. Melvin Taylor.

The Rev. Thos. Bole was succeeded by Rev. F. B. Allnutt, Rev. W. Burnett, Rev. Dr. E. I. Hart, Rev. Wm. Timberlake, Rev. Williams, Rev. Isaac Norman and Rev. Dr. J. G. Joyce our ent minister.

During those years the growth of the Church kept pace with growth of the City and again the question of a larger building raised. For ten years this agitation had gone on, and it was 19 the ministry of Rev. I. Norman who gave unstintingly of time effort, that it was possible for this achievement to be attained. 11 time the Ladies Aid Society (now the Woman's Association) a cheque for \$750.00 to the Trustee Board to start a Building

Through the generosity of Douglas Methodist Church Trustees 00.00 was given towards a building fund. A further grant of 0.00 was received from Presbytery. These gifts together with

the proceeds of the sale of the old Church, subscriptions from Congregation, and a mortgage loan of \$25,000.00 permitted us to proceed with the erection of the present church, the corner stone of which was laid on September 20th, 1930 by Mr. Chas. Allen (Mayor) and the dedication address was given by Rev. C. W. Gordon, D.D., L.L.D. (better known as Ralph Connor).



The Church building was designed by Frank Peden Inc., Architects and Engineers of Montreal and was erected by Wm. Grimstead and Son Reg'd, General Contractors. The contract was signed July 29, 1930 and the building was dedicated March 15, 1931 by Rev. Isaac Norman, the resident minister.

Included in the building project was the installation of a 3 manual pipe organ (2 manuals complete) manufactured and installed by Franklin Legge Organ Company Ltd., Toronto. At a later date, 1935, through the foresight of Dr. Joyce and the generosity of the former American Presbyterian Church, after amalgamation with Erskine Church, our Church was presented with the choir section of its organ and its chimes mechanism, thereby, enabling our Church to bring its organ up to a 3 manual complete.

About two years later Mr. Norman while in his study was stricken and passed away February 5, 1933. In his passing the Church and Community suffered a great loss and a great friend. Following Mr. Norman's death, Rev. M. H. Sanderson was appointed Interim Minister.

In July 1933 Rev. J. G. Joyce, D. Th. assumed the pastorate of our Church and during his ministry it has continued to progress. The Church Ministers to more than 800 families in the community, and as at December 31. 1948 had a registered membership of 1155.


Due to the special efforts of the Congregation the remaining portion of the mortgage on the Church building was paid off and under the able leadership of Dr. Joyce the Church is now free of debt.




BURNING OF THE MORTGAGE

When Verdun United Church was dedicated on March 15, 1931, it had cost \$80,000. In the fall of 1933 there was a debt of \$1,800.00 on the organ, and \$2,965.00 on the pews in addition to the mortgage of \$23,500 on the church edifice.

According to the terms of the mortgage the amount of \$500.00 was to be paid every six months, but the Depression was beginning to usher in its disastrous economic effects. To keep the mortgage from being foreclosed, the Finance and Extension Board of the Presbytery had to come to the assistance of the congregation by paying interest charges for 1933 and part during 1934 and 1935. From 1932 to 1939 there was no payment made on reduction of mortgage as the congregation's energies were devoted to meeting the interest charge of nearly \$1500.00 a year and to the liquidating of the debt on the organ and the pews on which a higher interest was charged.

During the years 1931 to 1947, the Church paid \$18,067.22 in interest on the mortgage of \$25,000.00 From 1932 to 1941 the mortgage was reduced by \$3,000.00 and in 1942 by \$2,400.00. In 1943 a special mortgage campaign, sponsored by the Ladies Aid (now "W.A.") with the co-operation of Officials, was authorized by the congregation to eliminate the remaining indebtedness within the following three years.

The effort was most successful and on March 27, 1947, at a special service held for the occasion, the large audience assembled in the Church sounded forth their jubilation to the noble strains of the doxology as the mortgage papers sent upward their tongues of fire in unison with the people's paean of praise that echoed throughout the building in thankfulness to God for the great achievement.

VERDUN UNITED CHURCH IN 1949

As there are several members active in the Church today, who, as small children, attended the first sessions of the Sunday School, which led to the organization of the church fifty years ago, so there may be, and we pray are, children of the Church participating in today's celebration who, fifty years hence, will be active in the Church, probably organizing the Church's Centennial, and to aid them with historical material, we are stating a few facts regarding the organizations of Verdun United Church in 1949.

The congregation consists of more than 800 families. The increase of population is due to the influx of people during the war years, and since, to the new part of the city, is shown by the record number of 100 baptisms in 1948 and 56 marriages, second only to the record of sixty during the war years. The membership of the Church is recorded as 1155.

There are thirty elders elected to look after the spiritual nurture of such a large number; one minister to attend to all the pastoral and hospital calls as well as all the organizational obligations. Since last Fall the Church supplied him with a secretary for the mornings.

The Sunday School enrollment is 612. It has a Cradle Roll of 217, a Nursery Department that meets on Sunday Mornings, as do the Beginners and Primary Departments. The Junior and Intermediate Departments meet at 10.45 a.m., having changed last Fall from Sunday afternoon to the morning to hold their sessions.

The Sunday School is well equipped for visual aid. The 16 mm talkie projector purchased by the school in 1947 through the efforts of the few men active in the School, and its use on Saturday afternoons and evenings has assisted the school in providing the best type of screen, a reflectoscope purchased in the Fall of 1948 and a large collection of beautifully coloured hymn slides. A sad commentary is the shortage of men as teachers, in fact, adults, most of the teachers in the school being of adolescent age, which is surely, a testimony to the religious influences of their home and Church.

The girls of the Sunday School constitute the Junior Choir of twenty-two voices and a Percussion Band of thirty instruments. Eleven older girls compose the Intermediate Choir.

For at least twenty years the C.G.I.T. has been the organization for the Church in which many of the girls have found their through-the-week religious activities. There are four groups with a membership of thirty-five. The Explorers were organized two years ago and consist of two groups with twenty on the roll.

Boys activities centred around the programme of the Boys Brigade and Life Bovs. At the beginning of the Second World War the Brigade experienced its highest accomplishments. The War, through the enlisting of a number of the members of the Band, meant the breaking up of the Band of about thirty instruments. The Brigade through its summer camp activities, badge work and Sunday School and other activities were significant factors in the formation of character. In 1949 the enrollment is not half of what it was a few years ago, the lag, apparently, is inexplainable, as it seems to apply to all other boys organizations. The Life Boys have flourished through the years and today is the largest of the through-the-week groups.

The Woman's Association is more vital and industrious than ever. It was indispensable to the Church in reducing the debt on the Church edifice, and, no doubt, will be in raising funds necessary to build a manse. The W.M.S. consists of a small number of faithful members, but the "Louise Young", an auxiliary consisting of mostly young married women is most vigourous and has a membership that fills the Church Parlour. The Mission Band meets weekly, and the Baby Band by special invitation. The W.M.S. organization raised \$530. the "M & M" \$976. in 1948.

The value of the Church building is set at about its cost of \$82,500, with insurance carried amounting to \$75,000. Raised in 1948 by Sunday School \$1,460; through-the-week organizations \$445; Woman's Association \$1,803; by the Church for all purposes \$17,028. An oil burner was installed in the furnace to replace the coal burning system. At the Annual Congregational Meeting in January, a committee was appointed and empowered to proceed with a financial campaign, to prepare plans and ascertain costs, in order for the Church to have a manse as a residence for it's minister.


